OFFICE SPACE

Revolution Mill is home to nearly 250,000 square feet of Class A office space ideal for small businesses and large corporations alike.

The campus offers a wide range of office sizes with bright, open floor plans, glass-walled offices, meeting and conference facilities, an on-site fitness center, and dedicated parking.

The Grove, our coworking space, has been designed for businesses who are looking to take their work to the next level without boxing themselves into a traditional office.

OUR HISTORY

Revolution Mill was opened in 1898 by brothers Moses and Ceasar Cone. The first flannel mill in the South, Revolution helped establish Greensboro's manufacturing tradition and the Triad's prominence as the center of North Carolina textile manufacturing. In 1984, Revolution Mill ceased production and shuttered its doors, sitting vacant for the next two decades before early redevelopment efforts began. In 2012, Self-Help acquired the 45-acre campus and commenced full redevelopment of the campus.



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
